Ministers Report

As we look back over the past year in Pilgrims Way Church we can see that there have been signs of growth and encouragement as well as challenges to face and questions to answer. There has been laughter as well as tears. And there has been achievement as well as frustration. But, in all of this, there has also been a lot of hard work by many people, and a noticeable deepening of fellowship between us all. On the whole, then, it has been a positive year.

Although church growth cannot, and should not, be assessed purely in terms of numerical growth, it has been encouraging to see that the numbers attending both morning and evening worship on Sundays has increased over the past year. This is particularly true with regards to evening congregations. At a time when many churches are dispensing with their evening worship, we have seen a marked increase in our own case. On more than one occasion we have felt that we are outgrowing the Chapel! This does, however, present us with a very specific challenge. Whilst it is a joy to welcome new people into our fellowship, we recognise that since the majority of people connected with the church attend either only the morning or the evening worship, there is not the opportunity to meet, and to get to know those who attend the other services. We all need to be aware of this, and be on our guard to ensure that we do not allow a situation to arise where we think in terms of the 'morning' or the 'evening' congregation, or that one is more important to the life of the church than the other. We are still all one church fellowship, and should complement each other.

The same is true of Junior Church. They are also very much part of the whole. Numbers there have also increased over the year and we thank the teachers and leaders for their dedication and hard work in helping the children and young people to develop their spirituality.

Pilgrims Way congregation is wonderfully diverse and so over the year we have tried to offer a variety of worship experiences from differing traditions. The worship offered on Sunday evening, for example, tends to be quieter and more reflective than the morning worship. Also, as well as the more formal services such as Covenant Service,

Ash Wednesday and Good Friday, we have the more informal Family Services and Wednesday Fellowship. We have worshipped at different times of the day, ranging from sunrise worship on Easter Day, through lunchtime meditations in Holy Week, to midnight worship on Christmas Eve and New Years Eve. Worship is also about collaboration and so it has been good over the year to see worship lead 'in house' by the Elders, the Junior Church and Worship Teams, and not just by local preachers and myself.

In my report last year I commented on the necessity for us to encourage each other as members of the church fellowship and to help each other discern the part we are called to play in the church. We have certainly come some way in this, and it is pleasing to see that we are becoming more open to, and are seeing as valuable, the contributions of others. Thankfully this does not just seem to apply to those who have been part of the church for a while. The contributions of newcomers and those who are with us for just a short time are also being welcomed. However we are still grappling somewhat with the challenge of balancing the need to allow people to be as much or as little involved in the church as they feel is right for them, with the equally important need of having enough people willing to give of their time and effort to fulfil the tasks that are needed to help the church function day by day. This is perhaps one of the biggest challenges facing Pilgrims Way. The church here would not survive without all those who give of their time and skills voluntarily to fulfil the many tasks needed in order to make both the building and the worship a more comfortable and welcoming experience. Their work is greatly appreciated. However some of these tasks rely on just a few people to fulfil them. We could always do with more help so, as you read these reports here, if there is a rota you would like to be included on, or a church group that you would like to be part of, then please think about it, pray about it, and talk to someone! We do not expect perfection in the tasks, just enthusiasm and a willingness to be involved. We are not going to turn anyone away. Likewise you may feel that we don't offer the right groups for you. If so, please tell us. Don't assume we always know what you want. And if you would like to set up a church group, again-talk to us about it. Being church is all about finding ways of sharing

fellowship with each other. Meanwhile please continue to pray for those who lead church groups as they strive week by week to deepen peoples awareness of God at work.

The members of the church Council and the Finance and Property group have worked tirelessly over the past twelve months, and we thank them for their commitment and their vision. The work they do in dealing with church issues and future planning is invaluable for the smooth running of the church. Mention must also be made of the Elders. It is now three years since their appointment and in that time they have explored and developed their role. It is good to see that the church feels that their presence is important, for they do provide a valuable spiritual and pastoral role to the church. In accordance with the wishes of the AGM when they were appointed, the Elders have recently undergone a three-yearly review. This was a very useful and worthwhile process. On a personal note they have continued to be a tremendous personal support for me. Their advice and constrictive criticism have been so appreciated. Please continue to pray for all these people.

As you read these reports you will see that the building is not just used by church people. It is very much a community resource. For a large part of the week community groups hire our precise for a wide range of activities. Although we are not quite full to capacity, it is encouraging to see so many people coming into the building. Sue, our part-time administrator has continued her work in providing an effective church contact with the different users, and as a result of this work, and her daily presence in the church office, it is not often that the building is closed. An open church is such an effective witness. We must not become complacent however. The most effective way to witness to the community around us is not an open building- it is in the work and life of these involved in the church. In other words it is the responsibility of all of us.

One special word of thanks has to be given to Brad Emerson. Brad constructed and maintains the church website (www.pilgrimsway.org). He also produces the weekly news sheet, and has once again produced all of these reports for the AGM. Publicity and communication are

vital, yet time consuming, aspects of the churches work, and being able to draw on Brad's expertise in this area is so important.

It is with some sadness that I realise that this is my last annual report to the church before I move to Preston next summer. I would like to take this opportunity to say what a pleasure and a delight it is to minister to, and with, such a varied and diverse congregation. Both Pete and myself have been overwhelmed recently by the messages of love and support that have come from you. However, as one minister leaves another arrives, and the church is presently in the process of seeking a new Minister from next September. This is never an easy task but with prayer, discernment, more prayer and even more prayer, we can be confident that God will lead Pilgrims Way in the right direction and bring the right person to Pilgrims Way.

And so in the coming year may we continue to build on the strengths we have, boldly approach the challenges that are before us and look forward with eagerness and anticipation to what God has planned for us. And as we do so many we never forget that buildings may change, people may change and the world may change- but the gospel of the God who never changes, is one that always needs to be proclaimed.

Thanks to everyone who has contributed and make the crèche successful.

The crèche is growing and particularly this year has seen new born babies. We are truly blessed!

We are creating a safer and happy environment for babies, and toddlers.

Children who attend are encouraged to draw or scribble on the paper and take home with them, there are also toys which they can play with, such as bicycles, tricycles, buses and lots of toys. Those that attend regularly enjoyed plenty of attention. Some children who attend for the first time may even refuse to stay which may take a little longer to settle down and this is where we encourage their parents to stay and introduced the child and until they feel comfortable.

We can report that the volunteers from Junior Sunday School Classes, are very happy in taking part and they are always ready to help at any time. We appreciate their support and pray that God will lead and guide them in whatever career they choose!

However, we still need more volunteers for the Crèche to cover at least once every 2/3 months on a rota basis. Volunteers are required to supervise the children and when necessary accompany them to the toilet. Two people are required to supervise the crèche, although we may need to call on reserve volunteers during times when the class is too large and also in case of absent volunteers, therefore all volunteer must be available when the need arises.

Crèche is available during Sunday morning service. There are various age groups ranging from 5 months to nearly 3 yrs. Then they progress onto Junior Sunday School at the age of 3 yrs old. Class sizes range from 4/7 or more at anytime.

Traidcraft

Unfortunately, a less successful year than last. Church Rotas

One Sunday Morning in East Ham...

Imagine that you were coming to Pilgrims Way for the first time. Think of how many difficulties/ obstacles you need to surmount needed in order to even get into the worship area.

- Find Pilgrims Way road
- Find your way around the one-way system
- Walk Through car park (Intimidating)
- Through the front doors- which way next?
- Then where?- The Worship Area door isn't obvious

So

How wonderful then, to find someone there at the door to welcome you and point you in the right direction.

Even if you have been here for many years it is good to know that there is someone to greet you, to welcome you, to make you feel as if you matter - and we all need to feel like that at times.

So we thank God for the welcome stewards. What a wonderful, job they do. We could do with a few more though!

Flower Arrangers

We have several people who arrange flowers for the Church. The arrangements can take some to make so this usually happens on a Saturday. Flowers are bought by the person on the rota that week, with money from the flower fund, unless they are donated by someone in memory of a loved one. I prepare the rota so everyone knows in advance when they are 'on duty'. The whole team prepare the Worship Area for special festivals such as Easter and Harvest.

We always welcome new people to join us - if you feel you could help but are not sure what to do - don't worry. Just let me know. Several people on the rota started by working with someone else, until they felt more confident.

Sunday Morning Welcome Stewards

- Stewards on duty to welcome people should arrive at church by 10.00am.
- Welcome with a handshake and a smile
- If someone new arrives introduce them to the Duty Elder.
- Don't worry or feel embarrassed if you are not sure of someone's name or whether you have seen them in church before. Just ask. People won't usually mind and it is a good way of getting to know more people.
- If prayers are in progress when people arrive late, ask them to wait in the foyer until the prayers have finished before entering the church for worship
- You will need to stay in the foyer throughout the service to greet any latecomers and to maintain the security of the building. (You will be able to hear the service through the loud speaker system)
- The Welcome Steward Rota is arranged several months in advance, so if a date is not convenient please swap with someone else or contact Mac and she will find a replacement for you. Welcoming people is a very important task and it is vital that there is always someone to do this.

So, there you are, you have got into the building, you have been welcomed, you have been shown the way into the Worship Area.

But, what next?

- Does it matter where you sit, or are certain seats reserved?
- Will you need hymn books, or are the words on a screen?
- Are there Bibles available?
- Is there anything else you are going to need?
- What if you need to go to the toilet halfway through, how will you know where they are?

How refreshing then, to find two people inside the worship area doors to distribute to you what you need, to show you to a seat and to answer any questions you might have.

Even those who have been coming to Pilgrims Way for a long time find reassurance in the fact that these two people know what is needed,

when, and will look after your coming into church in order to make your experience in the church as comfortable as possible.

We do indeed thank God for the Door Stewards. We could do with a few more though.

Refreshments after the Service

Three people are needed to make tea and coffee and wash up after the morning worship.

They should arrive a little early to prepare things in the kitchen before the service:-

- Put the cups, saucers, tea spoons and sugar out on the serving counter
- Put a jug of water ready in the kitchen with glasses and bottles of squash
- Put a plate of biscuits on the counter
- Turn on the water heater and boiler (vitaly important!!!)

If you do not have a key for the kitchen or the kitchen cupboard please ask the Duty Elder who will open up for you.

- Leave the service during the last hymn to make the tea and coffee (8 tea bags to a large pot & 3 large spoons of coffee)
- When refreshments have been served collect the cups and saucers from the tables and wash up.
- Put the crockery away in the cupboards and turn the water heaters off.

The rota is arranged several months in advance so please swap if the date you are down for is inconvenient.

You have found the building, you have been welcomed, you have been given all you need for the worship, there has been someone to take you down for refreshments and introduce you to a few people. In fact you could say that your experience at Pilgrims Way Church has been a good one. What a friendly bunch of people. You have already decided that you will come again next week!

Door Stewards

Two Door Stewards are required for morning worship each week.

Door Stewards should arrive by 10.00am and put out the appropriate hymn books, news sheets, and any other sheets required for the service. The organist or vestry steward will know which hymn books are required

As members of the congregation arrive they should be greeted with a handshake and smile and handed a hymn book. Any newcomers should be shown to a convenient seat. If accompanied by a child advise them of Junior Church or crèche as appropriate. Do not give children a news sheet unless otherwise instructed

Sit at the back of the church during worship so that you can be ready to assist any latecomers. Do not allow latecomers to enter church during prayers or other quiet times. After the service has started ensure that people enter quietly and help them to find a seat by identifying empty ones.

Ask two members of the congregation to help you collect the offertory, or more if you are unable to collect it yourself. When the Offertory is announced collect from the front to the back and then carry it forward to be blessed.

At the close of the service take back the hymn books from the people as they leave and collect any left on the seats. Put them away in the cupboards

Invite newcomers to stay for refreshments, and if appropriate find a member of the congregation to escort them to Myrtle Hall.

The Door Steward Rota is published every six months, Please swap if the date you are put down for is inconvenient.

You settle down to worship, and all too soon the service has come to an end, but what do you do now? Do you make a quick exit, although that is not very easy because everyone is blocking the doorway? Do you hang around, looking lost? It would be rather nice to get to say hello to a few people, but is that the done thing in this church?

So you make your way to the door, and then the door stewards invite you to stay for refreshments. They even introduce you to someone who will take you to the Myrtle Hall because after all you have no idea where that is, and anyway, even if you were to find it, you are not

quite sure of the system. So you go along with this person because after all this is a wonderful opportunity to join in fellowship.

And when you get to Myrtle Hall you see that many others from the congregation are there chatting- and people don't seem in any great rush to go home. Obviously refreshments after the service are well appreciated.

We thank God for the people who prepare the refreshments. We could do with some more though.

Communion Stewards

People are required to prepare, serve and wash up after Communion. Usually three people serve at morning communions and one in an evening. We would like to have a few more people on the list as some volunteers have moved away. The rotas are prepared three months in advance and the person in charge of preparing the bread and wine has their name marked with an asterisk. Wine (grape juice) is always provided so it is only necessary to bring the bread. Communion is open to all including children with the consent of their parents/guardians. Help is always required with washing table cloths and cleaning the silverware. Please speak to me if you would like to help in any way.

Vestry

The role of the vestry stewards is to support the minister of the day and help be sure everything is in order before the service.

We arrive about 10am on Sunday mornings, the hymn numbers are displayed, water is placed for the preacher, visitor's book and water is in the foyer, we welcome and prepare congregation for the service. We have a vestry prayer before the minister leaves the vestry.

We would welcome more stewards on the rota, if you are not wsure you want to commit yourself please come early and observe what we do. It is not difficult. We welcome all.

Sound System

Help required. This is an important job as all the congregation need to be able to hear the service.

Job Specification

1. Qualifications Required - None
2. Gender - Open to all
3. Hours - Sunday 10am approx. to 11.45 ish (according to preacher)
4. Remuneration - As number 1.

Do you meet all the above? Then come along and find out how the sound system works.

You will need to arrive about 15 -20 minutes before the service starts to get the equipment from the store cupboard and set up it up. Put the microphones in place and give the preacher the roving microphone.

After the service all the equipment needs to be put away.

The sound system is usually used for morning services, but occasionally it will be needed for the evening service if the church is used.

Worship Team

Once a month three members of a Worship Team help prepare and lead the morning service with a minister.

Requirements for the job.

Be available for about 2 to 3 hours the week or ten days before the service to plan the service with the rest of the team. This consists of:-

- helping the minister choose a suitable theme.
- Find suitable bible readings, hymns, call to worship.
- Arrange the order of service.
- Find or write the prayers
- Think of an appropriate children's item.

On the job training will be given, and no one is expected to do more than they feel capable of doing. For example training in the use of the microphone and reading from the lecture can be given.

Come along to the meeting to find out more about this important part you can play in the life of the church.
